Worth knowing...

- Although LSD is not addictive, it can cause distressing effects on the mind ('bad trips'). Occasionally, these can occur long after the LSD has been taken and has worn off ('flashbacks')
- There is a danger of accidents during the 'high'
- An acid 'trip' can last for eight to twelve hours and once it has started, you can't stop it
- LSD paper squares have motifs printed on them, such as a strawberry or Bart Simpson. The paper is like blotting paper and is chewed and then swallowed.

OTHER NAMES/SLANG:

Acid, tabs.

USUALLY FOUND AS:

Pills, tablets, capsules, or absorbed into squares of paper.

HOW IT'S TAKEN:

Swallowed in various forms – paper squares, pills, tablets, capsules, etc.

SIGNS OF POSSIBLE USE:

Tiny squares of paper, usually with pictures on them. Liquids or tiny pellets that you don't recognise.

EFFECTS ON USER:

Can make a happy person happier, speed up or slow down the sense of time and movement, and distort colour, sound and shapes. It can also produce hallucinations (which can be very exciting or very scary) and cause anxiety, delusion and panic. Pupils of the eyes dilate.
